NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

Junior League of Pittsburgh and Partners Support Drive-Up Diaper Distribution

In addition to its ongoing community projects and grants, the Junior League of Pittsburgh undertakes 2-4 service activities every month called "Done in a Day" (DIAD). For each DIAD project, a group of Junior League members directly assist a nonprofit organization or social service agency.



On Saturday, June 17, 2023, members of the Junior League of Pittsburgh volunteered at a drive-up diaper distribution event supported by our partners <u>Altar'd State</u>, <u>Global Links</u>, and the <u>Western PA Diaper Bank</u>. The event served 448 area families in just two hours and distributed 91,920 diapers to families from 67 unique zip codes.

Each family received about a month's worth of diapers, which has a value of \$80-100. According to the National Diaper Bank Network, one in two families in the United States struggles to afford diapers. This event helped to take one big expense off the plates of these families and allowed them to focus on other essential needs.

"Volunteering with the Junior League is a fun way to meet new people, learn about the greatest needs facing our community, and do something to have a positive impact," said Cari Goss Quinn, Community Vice President. "Through distributing diapers, we helped families have one less expense to worry about which will allow them to have a little more room in their budget for food and other needs."

PITTSBURGH CELEBRATES MAJOR MILESTONES

The 40th Anniversary of the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh

and the 20th Anniversary of ARCS

The city of Pittsburgh celebrated two major milestones on Thursday, June 8, 2023: the 40th anniversary of the Pittsburgh Children's Museum and the 20th anniversary of ARCS. Both organizations were founded by members of the Junior League of Pittsburgh.

In 1983, Jeanne Berdik cut the ribbon on opening day of the <u>Pittsburgh Children's Museum</u> as her first act as President of the Junior League.



Twenty years later, she had lunch with friends Vicki Griffin and Dr. John Anderson, then Dean of Carnegie Mellon University's Carnegie Institute of Technology, and said, "I want to bring ARCS to Pittsburgh." Following that lunch, Jeanne shared the vision with 10 other Junior League members and 10 outside friends. Without hesitation, they began collaborating and taking the first steps in establishing the ARCS chapter. As one speaker at the ARCS anniversary event said, these league women used to mention they were the "ladies who lunched," but should be known as "the ladies who launch."

To celebrate the occasion, the Pittsburgh Children's Museum thoughtfully hosted a luncheon on Friday, June 9, to celebrate the founding women of both the Pittsburgh Children's Museum and ARCS. About 15 women were in attendance, including the first director of the Children's Museum, David Crosson, and the first board chair of ARCS, David Payne. Some of the others in attendance included Ali McCrossin, the Junior League representative on the Children's Museum board; Jeanne Berdik, the founding president of ARCS; Thea Stover, Lou Gailliot, Ann Wertz, DJ Hammerschmidt, Ann Gabler, and Becky Torbin.

"The 101st year of the Junior League of Pittsburgh is themed 'New Beginnings, Fresh Starts, and Trying New Things,'" said the League's President, Angela Broussard. "These founding women showed this courage by taking an idea and making it come true through determination, hard work, and collaboration. The Junior League of Pittsburgh is proud to have been a part of these two important milestones in Pittsburgh's history. The founding women of both organizations have made a lasting impact on our city and on the lives of countless children."

2022-2023 JLP AWARDS WINNERS

Anne D. Johnston Award: Thelma Lovette Morris

The Anne D. Johnston Award, named after one of the Junior League of Pittsburgh's most esteemed and beloved members, is presented to an individual or group that has made an outstanding contribution to the League and the community.

In 1984, Thelma Lovette Morris joined the Junior League of Pittsburgh where she held various offices and served on many committees. The daughter of civil rights leaders and a trailblazer, Thelma was the first African American to serve as President of the Junior League of Pittsburgh from 1990 to 1991, and she is the living embodiment of the motto, "women building better communities."

Under Thelma's leadership, the Junior League sponsored a community awareness program called, "Don't Wait to Vaccinate," and co-sponsored the creation of the North Hills Affordable Housing program, which helps homeless women and children transition to housing. The program, now known as HEARTH, is one with which the League is still involved from time to time. For the Association of Junior Leagues International, she served as both a Child Health and a Public Policy consultant, and, as a Sustainer, she continues to bring Leaguers together to share information.

Currently, Thelma serves on the Board of The McAuley Ministries Foundation, and she has previously served on the National Philanthropy Committee for The Links Incorporated, the Board of Directors of the FISA Foundation, the Pittsburgh Child Guidance Foundation, Urban League of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh NAACP, YMCA of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh Children's Museum, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Pittsburgh, Carlow College Alumnae Association, and many more. We are so pleased to honor Thelma and highlight the impact she has made in the JLP and Pittsburgh community.



Leaguer of the Year: Kate DiStefano

Kate DiStefano served as the Junior League of Pittsburgh's first-ever Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Director for two years.

As part of her groundbreaking efforts as the Junior League of Pittsburgh's first Diversity Equity, Including, and Belonging (DEIB) Director, Kate DiStefano helped shape the position and personally developed and presented "The More You Know with Kate DiStefano," a beloved and recurring part of the League's General Membership Meetings.

True to her DEIB focus, Kate also identified a new nonprofit partner for the Junior League to support that is actively engaged in addressing food insecurity: the Islamic Center of Pittsburgh.

Kate not only excelled as DEIB Director, she truly embodied what it means to be an inclusive leader. She is, by nature, a very kind and welcoming person that was always willing to lend a helping hand.
