Hello Leaguers! What a busy and exciting year it's been so far. You may have noticed a lot of changes within the League this past year. As an organization, we are continuously looking to improve the League experience for our members as we are also working hard to positively impact our community. Some of these changes have been dramatic.

The Training committee met at the beginning of the year and discussed ways in which we can provide opportunities for members to be trained in leadership, women and child issues and community impact activities aligning with our position statements. As we started to investigate how to do this, we realized that opportunity was all around us.

Our discussions lead to a dramatic departure from previous training opportunities by providing the ability for members to earn training credits outside of established League events. The training committee met and laid out new approaches to training credits which:

1) Closely aligned with our mission and position statements.

2) Provided more opportunities throughout the League year to earn training credits.

3) Provided exposure for League members to engage in

community training events that they may otherwise not have an opportunity to participate.

4) Provided an opportunity for the League to learn more about needs of the community by gathering feedback on the training attended by members.

The Board approved this new approach and you are now seeing several training events per month on the League calendar. League members can attend these events and receive a training credit by submitting an event report which in turn, provides useful information back to the League which may lead to other League activities.

Some of the approved training events are:

- Caring for Aging Parents
- Personal Branding
- Women Leadership Seminars
- Pittsburgh Area Networking for Professionals

We hope that you find the training events informative to provide the ability for you to learn about topics which align with the League's position statement; applicable to your daily professional and personal life, and flexible to meet your busy schedule.

Bottoms Up!

The 2011 – 2012 Provisional class kicked off their involvement in the League by hosting a diaper drive and happy hour, Bottoms Up!, at Villa Southside on January 19, 2012. All proceeds benefited the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank's Diaper Bank. Attendees were asked to donate a package of diapers or give a suggested donation of \$10. The event included appetizers prepared by the Provisionals, martini specials, live music by Zig Daniels of The Delaney's, and a fabulous Chinese auction with an assortment of donations from local businesses and restaurants.

Carley Latus, Chair of Bottoms Up!, stated "Our goal for this event is to achieve a minimum donation of 2000 diapers." Despite cold weather and blizzard conditions, the Provisionals collected 3,238 diapers, \$205 from the auction, and \$825 in donations. In addition to the event, some Provisionals held individual diaper drives within the community. With the funds collected from Bottoms Up!, in combination with the total diapers donated, the Provisionals were able to raise 12,551 diapers for the Pittsburgh Diaper Bank.

Many people don't know that 1 in 3 American families struggle to provide diapers and that 1 in 20 American moms have cleaned out and reused wet or soiled disposable diapers when faced with financial hardship. In 2010 the Junior League of Pittsburgh created a Diaper Bank at Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank with a \$10,000 investment as well as a donation of several thousand diapers. This Diaper Bank provides clients of the Food Bank and their children with much needed diapers.

Saying Good-bye to Strong Women, Strong Girls By: Katie Kozora, Lights! Chair



As we prepare to begin a journey with our new signature project, I wanted to take a little time to reflect on the past three years with our current project, Strong Women Strong Girls (SWSG). Aside from Redbook Training, and one GMM, my very first volunteer experience in the JLP was at the SWSG Reunion event in the Schenley Park Ice Rink party room. I can remember the day clearly, as though it has just passed. It was a nice fall day, and all volunteers were encouraged to wear Steelers gear, the theme of the event. I remember walking in and being blinded by the pink (at the time, pink wasn't my favorite color), along with the bright smiles of the SWSG staff. I was assigned to the registration desk with Vicky Guscoff and Katie Skocik, where we would be greeting guests and handing out swag. I recall chatting with Vicky and Katie, sharing stories of why we joined the League and having those, "it's a small world moments," when we realized we knew mutual friends. I also remember the smiles on the girls' faces, along with the gratitude from their parents and families, not only for the day, but for the whole year and how much they had learned in the program. SWSG is a mentoring program for girls in grades 3-5, and some of the girls had recently "graduated," their little sisters just starting. It was awesome to see how these girls were impacted by the women they interacted with and the lessons they learned. I was equally impressed by the many college mentors who were participating in an event that took place early on a Sunday. Most importantly, I remember going home and telling my husband all about it. That event assured me that I wanted to be in the League, and that I wanted to focus some of my time on our signature project.

From that day on, I signed up for as many SWSG events as I could. I took SWSG as my placement in both my provisional and first active year of the League. I've attended numerous SWSG mentor trainings over the past three years, as both a volunteer and a mentor participant. At these trainings, I not only learned more about the program, but more about myself. This has been particularly true of my involvement in the SWSG Leadership Program (formerly Mentor to Mentor). In this role, I served as a leadership coach to a current SWSG college mentor. Last year, my mentee was from Duquesne, this year Point Park. Both relationships similar, yet different. Through each, I learned how tough it can be to be a college woman in the digital age, how things like negativity and jealousy affect women at every age, and how by just listening, I could help my mentee to turn her day around. We'd meet over coffee or lunch, swap stories and provide advice to each other. It was during a rough period of my own that I met with my mentee and discovered she was going through something very similar. By guiding her through the process, I was able to resolve my own issues as well. It was definitely a remarkable day. Just hearing, "Thanks, I'm so glad that I met with you," meant the world to me.

My other favorite SWSG event is their annual Jump Into Spring celebration. This day is all about the girls - celebrating each other, women, another great year and spring, of course. I'd classify the event as a large scale field trip (only on a Saturday) where girls from all the participating schools are encouraged to attend. College mentors are chaperones for the day, and really keep things in order. The bus picks the girls up at their SWSG location and takes them to Pitt's campus where a large scale jump roping event ensues - chock full of fun activities, inspiring speakers, music and local celebrities. The day of fun winds down around noon when the girls head back to their bus and are surprised with a hand packed lunch to eat on their way. Last year, SWSG decided to add to the fun by hosting a Salsa Social the night before Jump Into Spring. My mentee was on the planning committee and I was asked to help as well. It was great to see her in action - making plans, finalizing details, shining as her school won the award for the most attendees. It went so well that I was asked to be a part of the planning committee this year again. Although my mentee is gone, her close friend is on the committee and I'm enjoying seeing her progress professionally as well. Looking forward to the April event, I'm super excited as we've added a few more elements this year - and my brother is the guest DJ!

Above it all, one of the best things about my involvement with SWSG was the many friendships I have made over the past three years. Not only with my mentees and the SWSG staff, but with all the women in the League that I got to meet and share these experiences with. Vicky and Katie were two of my first friends in the League. Kesha Pate was a third, as we were teamed up for a SWSG activity at one of the first GMM's (the puzzle game!). It was after a SWSG training that I got my first League "friend request" on Facebook. I remember hall monitor duty with Lisa McCarthy at one of the many trainings and coordinating transportation with Angel Mazack at JIS 2010. I had the pleasure of working with Leah Worbs and Chrissy Belgodere through the 2010/2011 year, and Alaina Warren and Heather Tomko in 2011/2012. I became great friends with Gretchen Smathers as she was the Community Director during my second year. We often bounced ideas off each other about the organization and put together an informative PowerPoint for a GMM. I got to interact with Nancy Davis, Julia Carlson, Kristina Broumand and Shernell Smith through the Leadership Program. I remember seeing Jen Daurora on the floor of Jump Into Spring 2011, and was amazed by the line of JLP volunteers making sandwiches for that event. All of these relationships mean something to me, plus so many more.

In closing, as we say good bye, I am thankful to the League for providing me with this opportunity. I have no doubts that our involvement not only helped my personal growth, but the SWSG organization as well. They started small and are now empowering over 400 girls at 26 partner sites, with over 135 mentors from five college chapters in Pittsburgh. I know that this organization will live long in my heart, for they have taught me, "I am strong, I am proud and I'm not afraid to shout it out LOUD! Strong Women Strong Girls, Strong Women Strong Girls." My wardrobe also includes a lot more pink these days.

Hill House: Celebrate Taste & Inspire

On March 17, Junior League members went to the Kaufman Center at the Hill House for Celebrate, Taste & Inspire - a Kids In The Kitchen event. Volunteers arrived onsite and prepared food for chicken wraps, sweet potato fries and yogurt sundaes. Families from the community were invited. While the children were off having fun, the adults had the opportunity to interact with an artist who will be creating a mural in the Hill District Shop 'N Save.

Downstairs, the children colored chef's hats and made chicken wraps and yogurt sundaes. The children chose what they wanted on their wraps from a number of ingredients — whole wheat tortillas, rotisserie chicken, provolone cheese, lettuce, red and green bell peppers. The children also made yogurt sundaes with vanilla or strawberry yogurt topped with strawberries, blueberries, pineapple and/or granola.

A nutritionist from the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank had a table and she spoke to the kids about healthy food choices. They also played a game invented by Jessica Higgs, a Provisional, called Food Factor where kids were asked to try different foods that they might not be familiar with (avocado, hummus, whole wheat pasta, dried apricots, mango, black beans, pomegranate juice, jicama fruit, asparagus). As the day ended, we gave the kids snack bags from our Go-Slow-Whoa programs, Kids In The Kitchen measuring cups, fruit snacks and fruit stand matching game cards.

We spoke with some of the parents and adults as they were leaving. They all said they had a great time and wished more families would have come to enjoy the event.

We gave all of the leftover groceries (that were donated by Shop 'N Save) to the Hill House.

Even though we didn't have a lot of people come the event, those that did had a great time and learned a lot.





Ready. Set. Sale! will take place on Saturday, May 5 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in front of the WAS at 4752 Liberty Ave., in Bloomfield. On this day many businesses that line Liberty Avenue will be participating in a community sidewalk sale during the much anticipated Pittsburgh Marathon weekend. The marathon is scheduled for Sunday, May 6.

With this event, the provisional class hopes to make a proactive and positive impact for the future of the Wear After Shop. Many League members discussed the future of the Shop at the organization's February Speakouts and expressed ideas about what can be done to make the store a better, more pleasant place to shop and volunteer. The Provisional Class understands the challenges facing the business and seeks to help with hosting a successful event.

"We want to bring the community back to the WAS, not just the JL community, but the wider Pittsburgh community, through outreach before the sale and by engaging with the public during the sale to create a base of new and repeat customers," said Eliza Jane Bowman, co-chair of the Spring Provisional Project.

The League opened the WAS in 1925. The business sells donations of new and gently used clothing, accessories and small household items and returns approximately \$15,000 to the League annually. In addition, the WAS partners with the Women's Center and Shelter of Greater Pittsburgh to provide clothing at no charge to the program's participants. During the League's 2007-2008 year, the Shop donated more than \$3,000 in clothing to over 100 women and 70 children in the program. "Show Me The Money"...and ladies you certainly have, thank you!

We've had another wonderful year in 2011-2012. In the month of December alone our membership volunteered 131.5 hours, which is the equivalent of an investment of approximately \$2,800 in our community! In November, our 4th annual American Girl Fashion Show had another successful turn at raising over \$20,000.00 to be used for our future signature project and community impact. We were able to give Strong Women, Strong Girls our final installment of \$15,000.00 in our final year of our three year signature project partnership. The Provisional's Bottoms Up fundraiser/project on January 19 was a great success, collecting 3,238 diapers and \$1,030. To top it off our membership as a whole has brought in over 13,000 diapers as of February to give to the Bottom's Up campaign and Greater Area Pittsburgh Food Bank. Our Kids In the Kitchen program has been able to provide our community with training and education throughout the year, thanks to funds raised by our American Girl Fashion Show. The Wear After Shop continues to provide the community with gently used clothing and we continue to support the local women's shelter with our partnership (and if you have not been by lately, go take a look it's had a little bit of a "make-over" as an on-going effort to improve the store as a whole). Finally, our Earned Income Opportunities, put together by Chair Jenn Tribble, have been thriving. From raising \$400 through the poinsettia sale over the holidays to a dinner at Mad Mex in Robinson where 100% of the proceeds came back to the League. She's also brought us an evening with Pampered Chef and is making our Springs brighter with Easter/Spring flowers. It just goes to show you that FUNdraising and Communicty Impact can be so beneficial and worthwhile!

Outside of our specific fundraisers, we've seen our endowment fund and annual appeal grow with donations through our members and the Pittsburgh Foundation. We participated in the Pittsburgh Foundation's annual PittsburghGives - Day of Giving. And our investment advisor Carrie Coghill has been working diligently for us to ensure our investments are strong for our future.

It's also that time of year for dues. This year we've seen an increase in dues per AJLI. The Association of Junior Leagues International, Inc., as we know, is a Mission-driven organization with an ambitious Vision shared by 155,000 women in four countries, and countless others who have yet to be tapped. A Vision of this scale and magnitude cannot be realized without thoughtful and prudent investment. Therefore, the AJLI Board recommended that the per capita dues be increased a total of eight dollars (\$8), from \$35 to \$43; four dollars (\$4) of the increase take effect on July 1, 2012, with the entire increase becoming effective on July 1, 2013. We, as a membership of JLP, decided to do the \$8 increase all at once, and you see that reflected in your 2012-2013 dues. We would not be treasurers if we did not remind everyone that your dues are to be paid by April 15, 2012 to not incur any late fees.

In closing, it's been an awesome year! We here in the Treasurers' Corner have enjoyed seeing the League thrive and watch what all we've been able to do with our funds as well as our volunteers and what all is still to come in the future. So thank YOU for "showing us the money"!

Sustainer Spotlight: Susanne Wilkinson

For this issue, I had the honor of interviewing Mrs. Susanne Wilkinson for our Sustainer Spotlight. Susanne currently lives in O'Hara Township with her husband James. Their daughter lives in North Carolina with her husband and their 10 year old son (Susanne's grandson). Susanne works part time at the Frick Art & Historical Center where she is a museum teacher, leading kids in projects which they can take home, or in role-playing skits about history. Her hobbies include travel and book clubs, not stamp collecting.

Susanne joined the JLP in 1977, when she moved back to Pittsburgh after teaching full time in Washington, DC. Her main reason for joining was because her friends were members, but her involvement quickly changed as she discovered the many opportunities the League offered.

Susanne mentioned that she was a "worker bee" more often than being a chairperson of an event, but she has fond memories of being the Publicity Chair for their annual Granny's Attic Sale. This upscale rummage sale was held in a large Castle Shannon fire hall, and members donated items to sell. In addition to press releases and advertising, Susanne dressed up as Granny and stood outside to promote the event. (Having been a costumed character myself, I could already tell that Susanne and I would have a lot in common.)

Another placement Susanne held was on the Ethnic Church Committee. This committee partnered with the Pittsburgh History and Landmark Foundation. Together they visited all kinds of churches throughout the city, took photos, gathered information and created a brochure for the Foundation to distribute. After the information gathering stage, the women would lead tours as well. This project also resulted in Allegheny Adventures, in which members of the League went to local schools and told the children about the history of our great city.

In addition to her service in the League, Susanne's training prepared her for board positions at both the Three Rivers Shakespeare Festival and the Steven Foster Theater. Her most rewarding JLP experience was, "all of the above!"

On being a Sustainer, Susanne reminisced about the Sustainer Derby Day parties she used to host at her home in Fox Chapel, where everyone would dress up and cheer on their favorite horses. But she also mentioned that her friends from the League are still her friends so, although they aren't official Sustainer events, they do get together often.


Like most of our Sustainers, Susanne is still very involved in the community, particularly with the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Art Museum at the Carnegie and The Frick. She also leads docent tours of the Duquesne Club downtown.

When asked what the Junior League of Pittsburgh meant to her, Susanne replied, "It opened my world to my city that I came back to. It really changed my world as a volunteer and gave me the confidence I needed to lead other groups." Susanne also noted the organizational skills that she learned from League service, mentioning the importance of board reports and staying on top of things. She said they had, "an organized objective." While her profession was a school teacher, her experiences in the League were so very different and opened doors to more planning and organizing opportunities, especially events, which were her favorite JLP activities.

Susanne's advice to current members is, "Take advantage of all the opportunities that the Junior League provides. And remember, whatever you give, you will get back." It was through her friends that she decided to be a member, but through her experiences that she learned to be a volunteer, a passion she still has today. She learned how to cooperate with women in a different way - working together for common goals and having fun in the process.

In parting, Susanne leaves us with her favorite quote, "If it wasn't for the last minute, nothing would get done." We laugh, as this quote refutes all the organization we have learned (and wrote about), but both agree it is certainly true.

Forty Years On– Wiser In Time And In Memory Strong

In this anniversary year, we are fortunate that our city's newspapers are telling the League story of forty years of giving to the community in a generous and exciting fashion. Here, at *The Lights* we think our readers may enjoy more of a family album, and so we have looked through old publicity and back issues of the newssheet for this little report.

Mrs. Garrett's Story

From our first president, Mrs. George A. Garrett, we have a warmly amusing memoir of our founding which she gave on our Tenth Anniversary in 1932:

"That day on January, 1922, stands out very clearly in my mind. It was a typical Pittsburgh day of that era . . . dark, smoky and damp. The lights had been on in the automobile when Mrs. Straight (AJLA) was met at the station at ten in the morning. . . .

"At that meeting were two honorary members and ten girls who were the charter members. The honorary members were Mrs. Maitland Alexander and Mrs. Edward Travers. Their husbands were the rectors of the two beautiful churches which stand side by side on Sixth Avenue. . . .

"After Mrs. Straight's visit, there was much work to be done, officers to be elected, membership enlarged and rules, the inevitable rules, all to be argued, weighed and decided on. . I remember one of the greatest troubles was making the volunteers keep track of their hours. . . We had one member who did not want to work but loved belonging to the League. After a few notices asking for her activities and hours, we decided to write her a note. The only answer we ever received was scratched in bold letters across the bottom of our letter, "Are you threatening me!"

"We decided to offer our services to the Children's Hospital, Kaufmann Settlement, Blind Asylum and Kingsley House. We had rather an unhappy experience at Kingsley when one of our volunteers unsewed the clothing and gave a bath to a little girl whose mother had sewed her up for the winter."
