HAPPY 30TH ANNIVERSARY, NATIONAL HOUSING CORPORATION!

Sigma Kappa's National Housing Corporation (NHC) celebrated its 30th anniversary this summer at their Housing Conference in Raleigh, N.C. Established in June 1993, the NHC was founded to manage the Sorority's greatest financial asset-its chapter properties-and make local house corporations more effective by providing financial services and technical assistance. Today, the NHC manages \$25 million in financial assets and \$88 million in real estate assets.

NATIONAL COUNCIL RECOMMENDATIONS OPEN IN NOVEMBER

At the 2024 national convention, July 10-13, the voting delegates will elect the national council of Sigma Kappa for 2024-2026. Members and chapters of Sigma Kappa are encouraged to recommend qualified women to serve, which can include self-recommendation. Through a nomination and election process that starts in November 2023, Sigma Kappa national council members are elected by the membership to serve for a biennium (two years).

The following qualifications should be considered: Sigma Kappa Sorority experience, including number of years served and positions held at a national or district level within the Sorority; qualifications for the specific office for which nominated; availability and willingness to carry out the duties of the office for which nominated; history of donating to the Sigma Kappa Foundation; history of alumnae chapter membership or payment of national alumnae dues; non-Sigma Kappa Sorority leadership experience, including experience serving with the Sigma Kappa Foundation or Sigma Kappa National Housing Corporation and other professional, social, philanthropic or local organizations.

The nomination form will be available on sigmakappa.org starting **Nov. 1**. Make your voice heard and help shape the future of Sigma Kappa!

Upon graduating Magna Cum Laude from Spring Hill College with a bachelor's degree in Biochemistry, Emily is now working toward her Ph.D. in Biochemistry and Chemistry at Baylor University. As a research assistant, she is focused on increasing accessibility within the sciences to those with visual impairments. Recently, Emily spearheaded an effort to increase accessibility in the STEM field for persons with blindness or low vision. Utilizing an ancient art form called the lithophane, which has been reinvented via 3D printing to allow for data sharing between sighted and blind persons, Emily hosted a three-day immersion in science for blind children. The purpose was to illustrate to these children that a career in the sciences is possible for them. Additionally, Emily's laboratory works with metalloproteins and protein aggregation, focusing on neurodegenerative diseases. Emily's scope of research currently involves RNA molecules and modifications to RNA, which she hopes will help mitigate various diseases and disorders by identifying their root cause in the form of RNA. In 2022, Emily won the Outstanding Teaching Assistant Award at Baylor University.

She also connects with young women who may be struggling with mental or physical health and has built a community centered around support and positivity.

Meghan is a versatile journalist and a rising star in broadcast news. The 2020 Penn State graduate serves as the morning news anchor at the ABC affiliate KMIZ in Columbia, Missouri, where she utilizes her skills as a reporter, producer and web content creator.

Samantha worked in a clinic in Macon, Georgia. for two and a half years, working her way up to Clinic Director, before starting her own business to meet kids where they are, including their homes and schools. Her business, Pure Heart Behavioral Therapy, LLC, started as a one-woman show and now employs two BCBAs and multiple Registered Behavioral Technicians (RBTs). Samantha's company has helped many children learn new skills and empower parents in their homes, as well as partnered with several school districts to better train their staff and assist students with disabilities and challenging behaviors by developing behavior plans and IEP Goals for those students. She also started a program at a local church allowing parents with special needs children to have a day or night out knowing their children are in qualified and capable hands. Samantha participates in events in her community such as the Special Olympics and Night to Shine and encourages people around her to get involved with this special population of kids.






The chapter loved getting to know all their new members and was truly reminded of why they adore this sisterhood so much.
